**DEVOTION** Dog-paddling and Lowering Expectations

On Sunday, Nov. 22, I watched our Thanksgiving themed worship service and had a curious experience: I discovered that the service was meaningful, effective, and beautiful. And why was that curious? Because I knew the backstory behind the service! That particular virtual service was arguably the most fraught with obstacles to overcome that we have had throughout this entire pandemic period of time. Our videographer, Scott Shelerud, was unwell with Covid-19; fortunately he was able to be home and is recovering well, but this meant that Jim Allert stepped in to edit, which immediately changed several behind-the-scene factors. Already submitted pictures or readings had to be redirected. Steve Carlson and Phil Berge were suddenly recording their wives being Pastors or Church Musicians in the sanctuary, a task for which neither has been formally trained. An element of the service was inadvertently left out and had to be recorded and added after the initial first You tube posting of the service, which actually was twice-reposted, due to vet another technical issue. The bulletin, which I send on to Melanie mid-week, had to be revised 3 or 4 times, as we had to add names to the prayer list or include Smart Team updates. In short, it was uphill sledding, and yet—none of that showed in the final, rich version of the service. I was reminded of watching a dog doing the dog-paddle; lots of frantic motion beneath the surface of the water, but above the water, all that is seen is the dog's confident head moving purposefully towards a goal. The fact of the matter is, all involved in creating our worship services these days have become expert dog-paddlers, whether we wanted to or not! But as one wise worship team member stated, "All any of us can do right now is our best."

I'm thinking this metaphor and wisdom carries over into our lives in general right now. If asked how we are doing, I imagine most of us would respond, "Pretty well". And in many ways we are, most likely, doing pretty well. On the other hand, we are almost all also carrying significant weights of anxiety and sadness right now as we deal with a Thanksgiving, and potentially a Christmas, that is just not what we would have envisioned or for what we had hoped. The combination of this dramatic surge of the coronavirus, the holiday season, and the more isolating season of winter is a rough one. No matter how "pretty well" we are, no matter how calm the face above the surface of the water may look, most of us are dog-paddling furiously under the water, doing our best just to stay afloat. I know that's true for me.

Which means what? At least one thing it means for me is to *lower expectations*. To accept, as that wise worship team member said, that "all any of us can do right now is our best." That translates into expecting less of ourselves—and of others—during these difficult times. Our scaled down Thanksgiving meal for just our household doesn't have to be a gourmet triumph. We don't have to force a holiday season merriment we may not feel. We don't have to compensate for not being together at Thanksgiving or Christmas by launching into excessive bouts of holiday shopping or out-zooming the next family in making connections. This is the time to lower our expectation for us and others and simply focus on doing the best we can under trying circumstances. Psalm 131 states, "O Lord, my heart is not lifted up, my eyes are not

raised too high; I do not occupy myself with things too great and too marvelous for me. But I have calmed and quieted my soul...." There may be times to aim for the highest goals possible and have great expectations of ourselves and others, but this is not one of them. This is time to calm and quiet ourselves and simply be grateful to God that our heads are still above water, and that God is holding this whole messy and sad world in God's hands. And those are good hands in which to be! May God grant to each of us the grace to lower our expectations and calmly quiet our souls into God's hands.

## SMART TEAM/CHURCH COUNCIL UPDATE, PLUS A MESSAGE FROM DR. ANNE SKADBERG

Our Church council has approved the following recommendations from the Smart Team in response to the current surge of Covid-19 in our community. Please read these through carefully. Also included is a message from Dr. Anne Skadberg. While she references Thanksgiving specifically, her words may well apply to holiday celebrations and events throughout December as well, so please take note.

#### **RECOMMENDATION #1:**

The Smart Team unanimously recommends that KRLC immediately suspend all in building small group meetings until further notice. Signs for Small Group guidelines should be taken down. Essential staff will continue to have access to building. Sign-in sheets will remain at both entryways and staff still asked to register so there can be quick contact/follow-up if needed. Additionally, they must schedule time for building use with Melanie McMillion (except for in/out pick up or drop off) and maintain appropriate safety guidelines – social distancing, masking, handwashing & sanitizing

Please read the following message from Dr. Skadberg:

Greetings All,

The time we were hoping wouldn't come has arrived; we are surging. This is the time to really pull back on activities and behave much like we did at the onset of the pandemic when we were trying hold it off so we could adequately prepare and supply. The hospital is very stressed right now and particularly the nursing staff, so we must try to push down this surge. The bulk of the spread is occurring when people who unknowingly have COVID, are unmasked and close to others. This describes the environment at our traditional holiday gatherings. We are very worried that the surge will worsen after these gatherings. It is okay and indeed smart to not gather with people outside of our own households right now. As kids we feel bad if our parents are spending Thanksgiving alone, however we are doing them a favor. I said to my mom," I don't think we should get together for Thanksgiving right now" and she said "I AGREE". I know she was relieved. I have talked with my patients about this and I sense relief when I tell them, "No, your college aged grandchildren can't come for Thanksgiving, nobody should". I think it makes it easier if someone, the matriarch, patriarch, or kid, comes out and says, "we have to pass on gathering this year". I think deep down everyone is okay with that and it may save suffering and/or grief.

The vaccine news is encouraging. There will be a significant improvement in this, we just need to do the right thing now to mitigate the damage it does in the meantime. Masks and distancing are essential and effective. Do not go to places where they are not being worn. We are seeing unusual complications in people who get through the initial illness, so I just can't stress enough how important it is to avoid any unmasked contact with people from outside of your household, and better yet try to isolate as much as possible.
